Reading with your Child A Helpful Guide for CtS Parents



It is always beneficial to talk to your child about what they are reading. Asking questions is always a great way to provoke discussion and understanding.



Before reading the book

Can you point to the title? OR
What is this? (pointing to the title)
What do you think this story will be about?
What might happen in the story?
What makes you think this?
What do we call the writing on the back of the book?
(Blurb)
What does the blurb tell us?

When reading the book

How do you read that word? Can you sound out the word? What does a full stop show you?

What has happened so far?
What do the pictures show you?
Is it what you expected to happen?
What might happen next?
How do you think the story might end?
Why do you think the character did that?
Can you find the bit that tells you...?

Why did the author write that?
What do you think he/ she meant by that?
Which word makes you think that...?
How does the story make you feel?



At the end of the book

What were the main events?
What do you like/ dislike about the story? Why?
Which was the best/ funniest/ saddest part?
How did it make you feel when...?
What was the most interesting/ exciting part of the book? Can you find it?


Place Value Counting, Calculations Recognising Fractions

By the end of the summer term children are expected to be able to:

- Count forwards and backwards from any given number up to 100
- Count, read and write numbers to 100 in numerals
- Solve one step problems that involve addition and subtraction.
- Represent and use number bonds and related subtraction facts within 20.
- Recognise 2D and 3D shapes
- Recognise the value of different coins and notes.

Ways to help at home

- Counting forwards and backwards
- Number bonds
- Mathletics
- Pointing out the time at key points of the day
- Recognise coins, practice giving coins and getting change
- Use the language 'half' and 'quarters' at meal times
- Play board games



In the Summer Term we learn about 'The Farm' and the children enjoy discussing their own prior knowledge and experiences of farms.



Setting a routine

<u>Daily reading</u> Children should bring their red reading diaries on their designated reading days. These should be signed by an adult who has listened to their child read. Daily reading is really important.

Free Choice Reading Book This is a book for you to read to your child,

Spellings Will be posted weekly on the google classroom. These spellings will be taught during the phonics lessons as part of the RWI scheme parents are encouraged to work on these spellings are home.

Maths: Mathletics online codes will be glued in your childs red reading diary.







Reading to your child

Even when children can read to themselves, reading to them is still hugely beneficial. Children need to hear a new word 12 times before they can use it themselves!

It is expected that by the end of year one children should be able to read 60 words per minute.


Year I Phonics Screener



In Year 1 children will undertake a phonics screener paper in the summer term. Children will read real words and 'alien words'. They will have daily practise of reading these types of words in phonics lessons.










Reading daily is still the best practice to help your child learn their phonic sounds and progress in their reading and writing.


